Odrpito pismo Olimpijskemu komiteju Slovenije

Spoštovano vodstvo Olimpijskega komiteja Slovenije,

z veliko zaskrbljenostjo sem spremljal novico, da ste odvetnici **Tjaši Andree Prosenč** podelili naziv **prve častne članice Olimpijskega komiteja Slovenije**.

To priznanje naj bi simboliziralo **integriteto, čast, poštenost in življenjski prispevek družbi**. Vi ste ta simbolizem in to zaupanje porušili, zato menim, da ima slovenska javnost pravico spoznati tudi drugo plat zgodbe osebe, ki ste jo počastili s svojim najvišjim simbolnim priznanjem.

Tjaša Andree Prosenč je bila dolga leta moja pravna zastopnica in odvetnica moje družine v zadevah povezanih s premoženjem na **Wolfovi ulici 1 v Ljubljani** ter z vsem ostalim družinskim premoženjem, ki nam je bilo vrnjeno po dolgotrajnih denacionalizacijskih postopkih zaradi povojnih kriminalnih krivic storjenih družini Mayer. Te krivice so povzročile aretacijo mojega dedka, njegovo mučenje v zaporu in na koncu njegov umor, hkrati pa tudi zaplembo vsega njegovega premoženja.

Namesto da bi zaščitila interese svoje stranke, je prišlo do **zlorabe zaupanja, ponarejanja dokumentov in nezakonitih sprememb v sodnem registru podjetja Eurocapital, lastnika stavbe. Na različne načine, vendar vedno z istim končnim ciljem: ukrasti premoženje**.

Ključni del te zgodbe je bila moja mati, **Doris Mayer**, starejša gospa, ki po desetletjih življenja v tujini ni več razumela slovenskega jezika in pravnih postopkov. Prav prek nje je **Tjaša Andree Prosenč** izvajala **nezakonite manevre**, s katerimi je njej in meni odvzela naše premoženje in si s tem zagotovila dovolj časa, da so potekali ključni roki za učinkovito pravno zaščito. V Sloveniji po treh letih od storitve kaznivega dejanja ni več mogoče vložiti kazenske ovadbe zoper storilca, ne glede na to, ali ste za dejanje sploh vedeli. Takšna zakonodaja ščiti kriminalce pred odgovornostjo za njihova dejanja ter spodbuja krajo, goljufije in korupcijo.

Ko sem dejansko izvedel za kriminalna dejanja Prosenčeve, mi je bilo onemogočeno sprožiti kazenski postopek proti njej zaradi zastaranja. To je popoln nesmisel, saj človek ne more ukrepati proti dejanju, za katerega sploh ne ve, da se je zgodilo.

V stavbi moje družine ima danes **Tjaša Andree Prosenc v lasti ukradeno stanovanje, njen sin pa dragocene ukradene poslovne prostore, v katerih opravlja svojo dejavnost.**

Še bolj zaskrbljujoče od same zgodbe pa je dejstvo, da **slovenske institucije v vseh teh letih niso uspele zagotoviti jasne in učinkovite pravne rešitve mojih civilnih postopkov. Med njimi tudi Odvetniška zbornica Slovenije, ki je popolnoma odpovedala pri sprejemanju ustreznih ukrepov proti Prosenčevi, zato zbornico tožim že več let.**

Ko se je Slovenija odločila za demokracijo in vključitev v Evropsko skupnost, sem verjel v slovensko pravno državo. Nikoli si nisem predstavljal, da je mogoče človeka toliko let pustiti brez učinkovitega pravnega varstva, medtem ko oseba z močnimi povezavami v političnih in pravosodnih krogih še naprej uživa ugled in javna priznanja.

Javnosti so dobro znane dolgoletne povezave med **Tjašo Andree Prosenc** in vplivnimi omrežji nekdanje komunistične elite, ki jo vodi **Milan Kučan, pod čigar zaščito je bila in ostaja še danes, saj naj bi bila dolga leta tudi ljubimca.** Prav zato se danes mnogi upravičeno sprašujejo, ali v Sloveniji zares veljajo enaka pravila za vse.

To pismo **ni napad na šport.** Gre za poziv k odgovornosti vaše institucije.

Ko institucija, kot je Olimpijski komite Slovenije, nekomu podeli naziv častne članice, ne priznava zgolj športnih funkcij. **Podeljuje tudi moralno legitimnost.**

Prav zato menim, da bi morali pred sprejetjem takšne odločitve upoštevati tudi širšo sliko in zgodovino osebe, ki ji podeljujete svoje dragoceno priznanje.

Danes to ni več samo moje osebno vprašanje.

Vprašanje je: **katere vrednote kot družba nagrajujemo?**

In ali **integriteta v Sloveniji sploh še kaj pomeni.**

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Open letter to the Olympic Committee of Slovenia

Dear leadership of the Olympic Committee of Slovenia,

I followed with great concern the news that you awarded attorney **Tjaša Andree Prosenec** the title of the **first honorary member of the Olympic Committee of Slovenia**.

This recognition is supposed to symbolize **integrity, honor, honesty, and a lifelong contribution to society**. You broke that symbolism, that trust, and that is precisely why I believe the Slovenian public has the right to know the other side of the story regarding the person you honored with your highest symbolic recognition.

For many years, **Tjaša Andree Prosenec** acted as my legal representative and the attorney of my family in matters concerning the property on **Wolfova Street 1 in Ljubljana**, and all other Family properties, which was returned to us after lengthy denationalization proceedings related to the post-war criminal injustices committed against the Mayer family, that caused my grandfather arrest, torture in jail and finally murder, while confiscating all of his properties.

Instead of protecting the interests of her client, there was **an abuse of trust, document falsification, and illegal changes in the court register of the company Eurocapital, owner of the Building. In a diverse way, the same final objective: to steal properties**.

A crucial part of this story was my mother, **Doris Mayer**, an elderly woman who, after decades of living abroad, no longer understood the Slovenian language or legal procedures. It was precisely through her that **Tjaša Andree Prosenec carried out illegal manoeuvres** - that deprived her and me of our properties - which gave her enough time for key deadlines for our effective legal protection to expire. Criminal charges in Slovenia cannot be brought against the perpetrator after only 3 years from the committed crime, regardless of your knowledge. This law protects criminals from being duly made accountable of their crimes, and incentives theft, fraud and corruption.

In fact, when I became aware of Prosenec's criminal action, I was barred from proceeding against her because of time lapse, a true nonsense, as how someone can take legal action without being aware of someone else's crimes.

In my family's building, **Tjaša Andree Prosenec now owns a stolen apartment, while her son owns a valuable stolen commercial premises where he conducts his business activities**.

Even more disturbing than the story itself is the fact that **Slovenian institutions, throughout all these years, have failed to provide a clear and effective legal resolution to my civil complaints, including the Bar Association that completely failed in taking appropriate actions against Prosenc, and I am suing the Bar Association for years by now.**

After Slovenia chose democracy and the European Community, I believed in the Slovenian rule of law, and I never imagined that it would be possible for a person to be left for so many years without effective legal protection, while someone with strong connections within political and judicial circles continues to enjoy prestige and public honors.

The public is aware of the long-standing connections between **Tjaša Andree Prosenc** and influential networks of the former communist elite, led by **Milan Kučan, who had and continue to have her under his protection having been lovers for many years.** This is precisely why many people today rightfully ask whether the same rules truly apply to everyone in Slovenia.

This letter is **not an attack on sports.** It is a call for responsibility for your Institution.

When an institution such as the Olympic Committee of Slovenia grants someone the title of honorary member, it does not merely recognize sporting functions. **It also grants moral legitimacy.**

And that is exactly why I believe that, before making such a decision, you should also consider the wider picture and history of whom is awarded your valuable recognition.

Today, this is no longer just my personal question.

The question is: **What values are we, as a society, rewarding?**

And whether **integrity in Slovenia still means anything at all.**

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
